The veneration and adoration of Mary is as old as the church itself. The earliest record of Mary's veneration probably comes from the Third Ecumenical Council at Ephesus in A.D. 431. There church fathers affirmed Mary as the Theotokos, or Godbeared. The title stuck, and today we refer to her as the "Mother of God".

She has many faces and innumerable names, among them Our Lady of Guadalupe, Queen of Angels and the Light Cloud of Heavenly Rain. She is said to appear on occasion, mostly to children or others who are weak and disempowered. She is said, in some cases, to procure miracles. Some have even said that in the last days, Mary will lead the army of angels in the final battle against evil. So when we pray the rosary, or bow our heads during the creed, we are honoring our mother and the mother of our Lord. Although she is not God, she has earned our respect and devotion. ~USC

### TREASURE OF OUR TRADITION

Every rectory office has received a panicked phone call from a person who has been invited to serve as a godparent, or from someone newly

engaged, who suddenly "needs to get confirmed." While the lack of confirmation is not an obstacle for marriage, it is for godparenting. Many are surprised that the Church seems to be looking for a kind of sacramental "seal" on one's baptism before the door opens fully to this ministry. Yet if you think about it, would you want someone to guide you to a place that he or she had not yet been? A godparent has to be someone who has "been there" and knows the way.

Although signet rings and wax seals have passed from use, our society depends on "seals of approval" ranging from certificates of quality to the familiar safety seals on medicines and foods. While Eucharist is the "seal" of the sacrament of baptism, there is a sense in which one's Christian initiation is also incomplete without confirmation. Have you been confirmed?

Perhaps it's time to inquire now, before you have to make that dreaded phone call!
