Lights and Shadows

I remember waking up so happy and feeling pleasantly light. Only that it was too early to be up and about. I looked at my watch and it was just like 5 in the morning. And my mass is only at 7 a.m. yet. Hence I decided to go catch some more sleep. I was later awakened by the ringing of my phone and when I took the call, the person on the other end told me that the people were already waiting for nearly an hour! When I looked at my watch, it was still 5 in the morning!

Synchronicity. This is what the gospel is teaching us and asking us to do. We have to be synchronized with God --- that is, for whatever we hear from Him (meaning His words) we should at least attempt to translate these words into acts, no less.

I had a penitent who once approached me and said she was feeling lonely because she was not on speaking terms with her daughter-in-law. Immediately I asked her: "Are you ready to forgive?" And just as fast, she said no. I asked her why. "Because she should be the one to approach me and ask forgiveness. I am the mother-in-law so it is not proper that I should make the first move." "So you mean you are not ready to forgive. Then why are you here now?" "Perhaps I will try to forgive her next year."

Unsynchronized attitude. God is forgiving and the lady penitent prefers not to forgive.

It is high time for us to check our watches in life. We do not have the luxury of time to follow our own standard of morality. It is either we gaze at and be guided by God's own clock where time is so full of love, pity, peace and forgiveness --- or we only watch over and pay attention to our own time which oftentimes is teeming with hatred, apathy, chaos and unforgiving ways. If we follow the latter for the rest of our lives, we will soon discover that our life time stops...
