### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Although the hours of daylight are rapidly dwindling, many people would say that these October days bring the year's most splendid weather. Americans are riders and joggers, not strollers, and so the pleasures of the season are often lost on us. This is not the case with many Jewish people, who observe an ancient rule in walking to synagogue on the Sabbath. On city streets and suburban sidewalks in many cities, we may notice around sunset the nicely dressed families walking and chatting on Friday afternoon. After a short prayer at dusk, the families stroll home again for a relaxing and festive meal. They return to synagogue in the morning, and then spend an afternoon in family leisure until three stars appear in the night sky and Sabbath ends.

Catholics, on the other hand, pile into the car and drive even a short distance to Mass; some even divide the family to participate at different hours. For Jews, the leisurely walk marks a dividing line between hectic life commitments and a day of abundant joy and enrichment. Before we became an automobile culture, Catholics embraced a similar pace, and in most places walked to church. These lovely days of fall invite us to tap into an old and life-giving tradition. If you live within a mile of your church, walk next week. If you must drive, park at a good distance and walk the rest of the way. Talk about your life, greet strangers, notice the crunch of leaves under your shoes. You may be surprised at how different Sunday Mass feels when it is framed by leisure!

# ⚡ ST. JOHN OF GOD SANCTUARY COMMUNITY ⚡

## 1986-2019: 33 Years of Immigrant Advocacy and El Salvador Support!

In 1985 the members of the St. John of God community embarked on an eight-month course of prayer and discernment regarding the plight of the Central American refugees coming to the Bay Area. Members studied Archbishop John R. Quinn's 1983 Pastoral Letter on Central America, participated in house meetings in which refugees shared their stories, and informed themselves about moral and legal issues regarding political asylum. In January 1986, over 90% of the parishioners voted in favor of Sanctuary. Since Palm Sunday 1986, our community has reaffirmed the covenant, which articulates the vision of faith taught by our brothers and sisters of El Salvador and Guatemala.

*Christ's call is to reach out to our brothers and sisters in need. In response to this call, the members of the St. John of God Community enter into this covenant to provide sanctuary -- support, protection, and advocacy -- to Salvadoran and Guatemalan refugees who request haven out of well-founded fear of persecution and possibly death if they are returned to their homeland. We do this out of concern for the welfare of these refugees, regardless of their official immigration status. . .*

As in the early years, Sanctuary work focuses on advocacy, emergency aid and accompaniment for immigrants in San Francisco and the Bay Area and support of development projects in El Salvador.

### ☀ Report on Projects ☀

Guided by the Spirit, we have continued the Sanctuary commitment to solidarity through:

**Human Rights Advocacy and Accompaniment:** Funds were given to the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity and Faith in Action to sustain their work of human rights advocacy for all people, regardless of immigration status. With the increase in deportations and more restrictive immigration policies, members of the St. John of God community have accompanied our immigrant sisters and brothers in deportation, asylum, detention and bond hearings. Seven members of the parish traveled to El Paso and Tucson to provide hospitality to recently-arrived Latin American immigrants. We have also provided bus passes to needy immigrants and established pen pal relationships through "Friends Afuera" with some of those in detention centers. Through our accompaniment and prayerful support, our sisters and brothers know they are not alone.

**Development:** Funds were given to anti-gang efforts at Santa Rosa of Lima Church in San Salvador to help parish teens continue their high school education in a collaborative project with the Ministry of Education. The teens study in a supportive environment safe from gang-related threats and intimidation. Also, funds were given to Voices on the Border and used to fund a domestic violence prevention program in Morazán, El Salvador.

**Direct Support:** In the past year funds were given to the Central American Resource Center (CARECEN), for legal and social services for local immigrants. This nonprofit is a leader in providing legal and social services to low-income Latino immigrants.

### ***STARTERS AND SMALL BITES***

Pack the court for an immigrant’s asylum hearing or ICE check-in. To sign up for email notices of court dates, email [lbarraza@im4humanintegrity.org](mailto:lbarraza@im4humanintegrity.org) and ask to be put on the list for A Su Lado (“by their side”) Bay Area. E-mail [sara@faithinactionba.org](mailto:sara@faithinactionba.org) and ask to be put on the list for Faith in Action-Bay Area.

Participate in a Freedom Campaign. Engage in public campaigns of individual immigrants fighting to get released from detention by attending press conferences, writing letters, organizing “pack the court” events, and bond fundraisers. E-mail [lbarraza@im4humanintegrity.org](mailto:lbarraza@im4humanintegrity.org) to receive alerts and notices about Freedom Campaigns.

***TODAY'S SPECIAL: Friends Afuera***

... a few more details about writing to an immigrant in detention

Many detained immigrants face isolation and depression as a consequence of their unjust incarceration, separation from family, and the potential for indefinite and prolonged detention. At the same time, they need funds to buy essentials like writing paper, stamps, food, deodorant and other toiletries/hygiene products. The prices are very high in prison commissaries, especially those run by private, for-profit firms.

With the closure of the ICE detention facility in Richmond a year ago, there was increased need for support for immigrants being moved to ICE facilities far from their homes and families. Recently Governor Newsom signed a bill to close two more ICE detention facilities in the state (Mesa Verde and Adelanto) by June 2020 and our partner organizations are expecting an increased need to support detained individuals as more individuals are moved to distant facilities.

Several St. John of God parishioners are participating in this ministry and report that it is very rewarding for them personally and also very appreciated by those in detention. This weekend, the St. John of God Sanctuary Committee would like to recruit fellow parishioners to sign up to serve an additional five to ten immigrants through this program.
